As we reach colder temperatures this winter, we are encouraging all students to dress in layers when coming to school. Temperatures in the building vary and fresh air vents remain open for circulation. We ask that all plan accordingly.

Next Monday, on 12/18, we will be instituting 2FA on Talos for all staff and students. 2FA requires two forms of identification to verify an account holder's identity and grant access to the account. This mandate will add an additional layer of security by making it harder for attackers to gain access to online accounts. 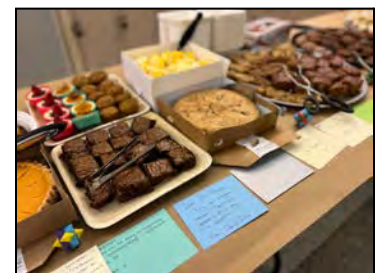

Report cards are also visible in the NYCSA account as well as on Talos by clicking "grades" then MP2 on the student dashboard of student/staff/parent Talos accounts.

The grades on the report card for Marking Period 2 are **numerical** and cumulative. Parents are encouraged to check their Jupiter accounts for classroom progress. If you need assistance with your Jupiter account, reach out to Mr. Lin at elin41@schools.nyc.gov.

Only the **third** and final marking period grade only will be the grade that appears on student transcripts for the Fall term. Grades are cumulative from the 1st marking period to the 3rd (final) marking period.



Spanish Honor Society Induction 12/14/2023

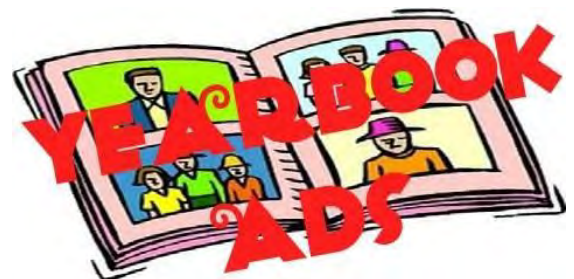

Mr. Sandler's Jewish History class tours a Danish Rescue Exhibit

Ms. Robert Sandler's **Jewish History** classes toured the **Courage to Act: Danish Rescue exhibit**. The exhibition tells the remarkable story of the rescue of the Danish Jews during the Holocaust. Together, Jewish and non-Jewish neighbors of all ages mobilized to create one of the most effective—and exceptional—examples of mass resistance and escape in modern history. Despite the enormous risk, ordinary citizens united against Nazism to save nearly 95% of Denmark's Jewish population. Using state-of-the-art technology and creative storytelling, the exhibit immersed the students in this inspiring story. Also featured in the exhibition is [the story of the Gerda III](#), one of many small vessels used in the Danish Rescue. The Gerda III alone saved



an estimated 300 Jews in groups of 10 – 15 at a time on clandestine journeys across the Øresund Sound to Sweden.

Afterwards students watched *Amid the Falling Walls*, an Off-Broadway Yiddish production that delves into the songs created and performed in ghettos, cabarets, partisan encampments, concentration camps, and clandestine theaters. The musical weaves in first-hand testimony of Holocaust survivors through their poetry and music, preserving their authentic voices. Despite the tragic loss of many of the young creators, their songs come alive in this theatrical production.

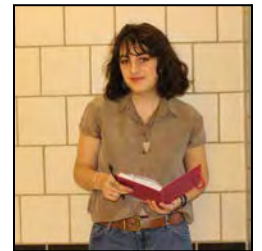
The Art Department is planning on having another show in the spring in partnership with the NYPL.

SENIORS: Change your email in Naviance

You may recall from our junior year presentations for students and parents last winter that we advised students against using their stuv.edu email addresses with their college applications. This was because in recent years some colleges have not been able to successfully email students at these addresses, an issue Google has never rectified.

Unfortunately, we have learned that this issue has resurfaced this fall. **Some college emails are not reaching students at their stuv.edu addresses**, from multiple colleges, including Northeastern University, Binghamton University, and University at Albany.

Students who used their stuv.edu address in Common App or any other college application please take note:

If you do not receive an email from any college with your applicant portal and login credentials within 1-3 days of submitting your application (check your junk.spam folder too), make sure to contact that college and ask them to change your contact information to a different email address.

Contact your assigned college counselor if you have questions or need assistance.



SENIORS: Advice on what to do if you're deferred...

As you are well aware, many colleges will soon release their early application decisions. It is also probably not news to you that a great many students who apply early to colleges are neither admitted nor denied, but, deferred to the regular decision pool. Different institutions will use the deferral option differently. Some simply deny most of the early applicants who aren't admitted outright, rather than defer them, while others defer most or all early applicants who aren't admitted...even if their chances for admissions are remote.

While some deferred students may end up being admitted in the regular decision round, *one must approach a deferral almost as if it were a denial and focus on remaining college choices*. However, if you are intent on pursuing a college to which you have been deferred, here are the steps you should take:

1-Reaffirm your interest. Admissions officers know that getting deferred can be very disappointing and may turn some applicants away from what was once their top choice. Upload a statement to your application portal or send an email to the college's admissions representative or undergrad admissions office reaffirming



your interest in the institution and briefly reiterate why it remains among your top choices. This need not be lengthy...and very often, being concise is best. But, for some colleges, this is an important step to take. **If the college specifically instructs students not to reaffirm interest or send additional materials, or asks students to use a specific form (like UMich or MIT in recent years), then just follow those instructions.** Also, **rest assured this should wait until after you have taken care of your regular decision applications (mid-January).**

2-Maintain your grades. We will automatically send out your final fall term transcript in February; a strong senior year performance can, at least in some cases, help your cause. Keep in mind that colleges may even request your second term report cards in March or April...so stay focused throughout the rest of the year.

3-Notify the admissions office about new & noteworthy accomplishments. If you have any important new information to add to your file...doing well in some extracurricular competition, completing a great project or writing a significant article for the Spec, winning a scholarship, etc... inform the admissions office by using the institution's web portal or emailing them. You certainly don't want to pester them with minutiae; that could be counterproductive. But you definitely want to share with them any significant achievements that were not included in your application.

4-Relax...you are going to college! It's easy to get mired down by disappointment when you are deferred or denied by a college. But remember that you are going to get good news this year, too. Highly selective colleges regularly deny applicants who are perfectly qualified and would do very well at their institution...*there just isn't enough room to admit them all.* You are here at Stuyvesant because you have a phenomenal skill set, and if you work with your college counselor to develop a healthy list of colleges, you are going to have some excellent choices this spring.

SENIORS: IMPORTANT; COLLEGE APPS AND WINTER BREAK!

Seniors: Remember that school will be closed over the break, so our staff will not be available to respond to emails during that time. Use these next two weeks wisely; if you want help with finalizing your RD list, your Common App, financial aid apps, or anything else before the break, make sure to make an appointment with your assigned college counselor using the links already provided to you earlier this fall.

Also, remember that Dr. Shere is available to help *any* senior in *any* caseload: cshere@stuy.edu

You can also drop in to see a college counselor during our open q & a periods: 1st period, 5th period, 9th period, 10th period, and often after school until 4:00.

We thought it might ease your mind to remind you that school documents can be submitted *after* RD deadlines as needed. This includes things like transcripts, rec letters, fee waivers, counselor signing of ED II agreements etc. So, if you notice something was not submitted for your RD colleges before break, or, if you add colleges to your list or apply ED II somewhere during the vacation, don't worry. **We will begin to submit any outstanding documents, approve fee waivers/ED II agreements, etc., as soon as school reopens on January 2.** Again, *this is perfectly acceptable for colleges and universities with early January deadlines; deadlines are for student application submission, not document submission by high schools.*

Just make sure that all of your RD applications are listed in your "colleges I'm applying to" list in Naviance by the time we get back to school on January 2.

Lastly, **for those students who made specific, rather than general, teacher recommendation requests in Naviance, remember that you will need to make additional specific requests for each college you add to your "colleges I'm applying to" list in Naviance.** Otherwise, these recs cannot be submitted. If you don't



remember how to make these requests, see the instructions in the Document Resources section of your Naviance account in the College Office folder. Make sure to check this over your vacation. And please make sure to take some time for yourself over the break...you have earned that!

Eco-Fact of the Week from Stuy's Environmental Club!

The production of cacao is often disastrous for the environment, as it fuels massive amounts of deforestation. Child labor is also common in the industry. Demand for chocolate has only increased in recent years: most chocolate is farmed in West Africa, but even chocolate farming in South America has increased by 10% annually over the last 10 years. One thing you can do to lessen this issue is to make sure you buy sustainably-produced chocolate. Beyond Good, Pacari, and Theo Chocolates are some of the best choices now. As always, remember to **help to preserve our resources and properly sort your trash!**
